Best Introduction to Gouache: Gouache 101 by Minnie Small This tutorial explores not only what it is and how you should use it, but also which brushes and paper are best suited for the medium. Before embarking on a new painting project, the first step is to properly prepare your canvas. Instructor Katerina Lanfranco, who teaches painting at Hunter College in New York, has uploaded two free videos to her YouTube channel (covering Canvas Stretching and Canvas Priming) to successfully lay the foundation for her painting. Both tutorials are really about best practices for producing an effective canvas. Lanfranco guides you through the materials you'll need to set it up, including a ruler, scissors and stretcher or strainer bars, and clearly guides you through the process of properly cutting your canvas and attaching it to the bars. The priming comes next: using gesso will create a flexible surface that receives the paint well and allows you to extend it more effectively. Lanfranco describes the materials for the process, including gesso, a gesso brush and sandpaper (to sand the surface after each layer, so that the canvas is smooth and ready to paint) and takes you step by step with easy-to-follow instructions. At the end of the course, you'll have a canvas ready to paint. Interested in trying or working to hone your acrylic painting skills? On his YouTube channel, artist Will he writes and creates his own videos on classical painting techniques, with a focus on the use of acrylic painting. Whether you're just getting started or have a more ambitious project in mind, Will's videos a variety of strategies for the medium. Start with simple basic building blocks, including proper cleaning of your acrylic brush, choosing your acrylic brush, applying acrylic colored terrain, and basic color mixing concepts. Along with a variety of videos about the right color mix, Will will also set you up with a series of painting tutorials, ranging from a beginner to a more advanced skill set. Learn the basics of painting a still life of acrylic for beginners, acquire knowledge of light and shadow techniques, and test your hand in acrylic landscape painting, palette knife techniques, portraits, painting skies, floral still lifes and even painting in the style of Claude Monet. And the best part: It's all free. Watercolors have a reputation for being a difficult painting discipline. This beginner watercolor course on Udemy will build confidence for new painters, giving you the tools to master the fundamentals and lead with a playful approach to the medium. All you need to get started is a box of watercolor paints, a round brush, watercolor paper, a black ink or felt-tipped pen, pencil, eraser, a clear or white wax candle or crayon, and two water bottles. Created by Nicola A. Blakemore, the course (about \$100) includes four hours of video on demand, and you can even access course materials on your TV or mobile phone. The goal of the class is simple: teach it how watercolor paints work with water and how to take advantage of that effectively. Blakemore's class will guide you through understanding the principle of color washing, how the same colors can create shape and shading, how you can create reflections and shadows with watercolors, and how to correctly mix paintings. Founded in 1929, the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) houses some of the world's most famous modern paintings. While visitors have queued to see Vincent Van Gogh's Starry Night or masterpieces by Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning, the museum now has online programming that you can access at home. Although MoMA offers a variety of free online courses that explore a variety of artistic disciplines, In the Studio: Postwar Abstract Painting focuses on the materials, techniques and conceptual processes of seven New York School artists: Kooning, Pollock, Yayoi Kusama, Agnes Martin, Barnett Newman, Ad Reinhardt and Mark Rothko. The free course is set up so you can work at your own pace and on your own schedule. Your instructor will guide you through demonstrations in the study and gallery tutorials, and assign readings to give context to the largest cultural, intellectual and historical events they gave to these artists after World War II. The class also includes a variety of optional study exercises, for which you'll need art supplies. Hopefully, they will provide inspiration for their own abstract paintings. Interested in making a foray into the style that created Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa and Les Demoiselles d'Avignon by Picasso? Oil paint uses pigments with drying oils as a binder, such as linaza or poppy oil. If you're a beginner, French artist Florent Farges has a variety of video tutorials on his YouTube channel that will help you roll the ball with your oil painting instruction. Farges follows the teachings of the 19th-century atelier method. The best place to start is oil painting for beginners, which is free. Here, Florent strives for simplicity. All the questions you may be thinking about, such as Why use oil paint, is oil painting more complicated? and is oil painting more toxic? are addressed here as well as a step-by-step painting demonstration. Once you're comfortable with the basics, there are many more tutorials you can choose from, including specific videos about oil paint drying time, pigments and palettes, settings for plein air painting, and, of course, tips for uploading your oil painting set. Understanding color theory is a critical skill for any artist. Not only does it explain the relationship between colors, but it's also key to understanding their combinations. When it comes to painting, color theory and paint mix go hand in hand. While there are a lot of scholarships available on the subject of color theory itself (see Josef Albers' Fundamental Color Interaction), getting to work with his paintings in his home studio will also open his eyes to how it works on the canvas. Jeanette Jobson's Free Color Theory & Blend - Basic Video is a great introduction to mixing, using a split primary palette. This palette uses two shades of each primary color (red, yellow and blue), with a warm tone and a cool one. Jobson clearly explains many of the terms associated with color and blending, including color bias. She guides you through what that means exactly and how each shade of paint illustrates that, with the variety of tones in her palette. Jobson then begins his mixing demonstration: an intensive course in the nuance of the process that will surely prepare him for success. Gouache is a water-based medium with a heavier pigment load than watercolor, and is therefore designed to be more opaque. In this video, artist Minnie Small breaks down the basics of gouache. This tutorial explores not only what it is and how you should use it, but also which brushes and paper are best suited for the medium. If you have experience with watercolors, gouache may be the next style of painting you want to play with. As Small explains in the free video, many of the tools you'd use for watercolor, such as brush type, will also work for gouache. Minnie illustrates the variable opacity of the painting, as well as its variety of beneficial, including its matte velvet finish, quick drying time and the fact that it can be reactivated with water after drying. Therefore, if you want to continue working on a part of a finished painting, you can rework it with ease. By selecting the best online painting classes, several came into play. First of all, painting is a medium with a wide variety of styles. Our goal was to represent as many of them as possible, be it oil painting, watercolor, gouache or acrylic. In addition, our goal was to select technical classes that would prepare you for success on your painting journey, such as how to prepare a canvas or the basics of color mixing, which were distinguished as important educational building blocks. Finally, accessibility was key. All the classes on this list are tutorials led by artists or instructors who clearly know their things and are able to communicate the complexities of their environment in a clear, concise and intuitive way for you at home. Depending on the discipline you start with, online painting classes can teach a variety of painting techniques. The classes we select play in various areas of the middle. They include stretching and baiting a canvas from scratch; understand color theory and mix the colors of painting; learn the foundations of watercolor painting; and master how to work with acrylic, oil and gouache paints. These are all skills that will build your painting practice. All classes on this list, with the exception of one: beginner watercolors at Udemy, which costs around \$100, are available for free. The materials you will need for your online painting class depend on the type of paint you are going to study. But for starters you will need paint brushes, paint of your choice, some form of paint and the materials required for stretching and priming your canvas.
